

Sandro Galea, MD, MPH, DrPH, a physician, epidemiologist, and author, is dean and Robert A. Knox Professor at Boston University School of Public Health. He previously held academic and leadership positions at Columbia University, the University of Michigan, and the New York Academy of Medicine. He has published extensively in the peer-reviewed literature, and is a regular contributor to a range of public media, about the social causes of health, mental health, and the consequences of trauma. He has

been listed as one of the most widely cited scholars in the social sciences. He is past chair of the board of the Association of Schools and Programs of Public Health and past president of the Society for Epidemiologic Research and of the Interdisciplinary Association for Population Health Science. He is an elected member of the National Academy of Medicine. Galea has received several lifetime achievement awards. Galea holds a medical degree from the University of Toronto, graduate degrees from Harvard University and Columbia University, and an honorary doctorate from the University of Glasgow.



Ivette Amelia López, PhD, MPH is a Professor of Public Health at University of Utah Department of Family and Preventive Medicine. She is also the PI/Director of the Utah Area Health Education Centers. Dr. López was born and raised in Caguas, Puerto Rico, and came to the United States mainland to pursue an advanced education. She is, and has been for decades, a dedicated professional in pursuit of health equity for Latinos and other disadvantaged populations in the United States. From AIDS (the epidemic

that drew her to public health) to diabetes, obesity causal explanations among minority women, to health assessments of Latino populations, her research and service are dedicated to engage minority communities in finding solutions to their health burdens. She has focused on social disparities, which have resulted in adverse health outcomes disproportionally affecting Latino and other minority or disadvantaged populations: Type 2 diabetes, weight issues, heart disease, hypertension, sexually transmitted infections, breast cancer, Alzheimer's disease, and environmental contexts of health. Her research interests also include mitigating factors that align with those health disparities: physical activity, food security, neighborhood, reproductive health, community-based mixed research and pedagogy, cultural humility, health literacy, and racial and ethnic disparities in higher education and health academic faculty/administration. Further, Dr. Lopez advised and directed the masters and doctoral theses preparation of over 55 students; chaired and labored with committees resulting in 30 doctoral degrees in 14 years. Most recently, as the PI/Director of the Utah AHEC, she works on a COVID 19 CARES grant that focuses on the engagement of Community Health Workers of disadvantaged populations in UT (Pacific Islander, Latino, Black, Refugee, and Native American). Through Tele-Education, this innovative workforce will the teach UT AHEC Scholars the socio-cultural and cultural humility aspects of COVID 19.



José E. Rodríguez, MD, FAAFP currently serves as Associate Vice President for Health Equity, Diversity, and Inclusion, is a professor in the Department of Family and Preventive Medicine, and Associate Medical Director at the Redwood Health Center. Since his appointment as AVP, Dr. Rodríguez has worked with teams across health sciences to increase the relevance and actions taken in the areas of Equity, Diversity and Inclusion throughout University of Utah Health. Scholarship has taken a central

role in his office, and multiple manuscripts have been published highlighting the excellent work in EDI that has been happening across the Health Sciences Campus. Before his appointment as AVP, Dr. Rodríguez has taken a strong role in advancing the institution-

al goals for health equity and inclusion. Within his department, he has served on the diversity committee, as well as various recruitment committees supporting focused recruitment of underrepresented ethnic and racial minority (URM) faculty and residents. He has represented the university presenting at national conferences on our work and his research on diversity initiatives.





Valerie Flattes, PhD, APRN, MS, ANP-BC has been faculty at the University of Utah College of Nursing (CON). She is the inaugural Associate Dean for Equity, Diversity, and Inclusion at the CON. For over 20 years Ms. Flattes has been involved in the work related to EDI efforts at the University of Utah and the local community. Valerie has a long history of working with older adults in various care settings. Valerie has been teaching at the College of Nursing for over 20 years. Her dissertation research focused

on heart health in African Americans aged 40 and older who live in Utah. One area of focus has been in community-based research with community organizations and the Utah Department of Health Office of Health Disparities. Dr. Flattes' research additionally focuses on patient communication, equity, diversity, and inclusion, and wellness in underrepresented groups.
